### Falkland Estate's Woods Between every two pines is a doorway to a new world John Muir

If you visited the Wood and Craft Zone at The Big Tent in July, you will have seen a wooden cabin with a bright green tarpaulin roof. Beside it lay the remains of a stack of freshly felled Sitka spruce from the forest of Falkland. It took the designer David Blair and his team of volunteers just three days to turn those big trees into a beautiful, solid building, using a portable sawmill on site.

The cabin, funded by SEDA (Scottish Ecological Design Association), will become the education base for Falkland Centre for Stewardship's new 21st Century Woodland Learning programme. In this one building, most aspects of the programme are represented: sustainable use of timber from the forest of Falkland; fine woodcraft; learning both traditional and new skills; involving people in managing and using the woods; providing resources that will encourage more people to come to Falkland to enjoy and learn about woodlands.

We are working with a whole range of people to develop this programme, including local schools, artists and craft makers, other woodland managers and like-minded organisations. There are many ways you can get involved. Come along to one of the events, or if you would like to know more about volunteering opportunities, just get in touch.

#### A new way

Over the last year, the three entities that manage Falkland Estate have been working closely together to develop this special (and somewhat hidden) place as a centre of, as well as for, stewardship. These bodies are landowner Falkland Estate Trust, Falkland Rural Enterprise (the company that manages the Home Farm) and the charity Falkland



Stewardship Trust. Our endeavour is at an early stage with promising new shoots. From the increasing range of land-based activity, such as free-ranging organic chickens, pigs in the woods and a revival of woodcraft at Chancefield, those who work on and with the estate are busy creating a new path to the future.

We have recently taken a significant step to strengthen our partnership by engaging in the role of Transitional Steward, Neil Anderson, known to many Fifers for his cultural, environmental and legal achievements. Over coming months you will learn more about this work to orchestrate our efforts for the benefit of this place and the community we seek to serve.

#### Further revelations of the Hidden Place

I'm pleased to report that the lost section of path up Maspie Den - over a wooden bridge, under a stone bridge, above the water - is now open once again. The Unfolding History of Falkland Estate (£4 from Estate Office) contains some remarkable images of this unique den and colourful burn.

Medieval historian and place-names author, Dr Gilbert Markus, has completed a fascinating booklet on the age-old mystery of the trenches called 'Place-names, Power and Protein'. The theories put forward by Gilbert and his colleague Dr Simon Taylor, are beginning to attract significant interest amongst historians interested in the management of royal deer parks.

Meanwhile the redoubtable Fife poet, Thomas A. Clark, continues to walk with us here. His recent small publication proposes that we might open up the Memorial Chapel for anyone to visit as 'a place apart'. So if you would like to visit this unroofed Chapel in House Park, you may collect a key from the Stables Offices. Ton has also created a major work, currently on display in the Ingleby Gallery in Edinburgh's till 25th September. 'The Hidden Place' is an alternative map of Scotland drawing from the meaning of place names and creating one long lyrical poem about the land and its people. Of course 'The Hidden Place' is also the most likely interpretation of the original meaning of the name Falkland, marked by our own small place in the map.

We are thrilled to announce that social entrepreneur Nigel Lowthrop has agreed to deliver the 2010 Stewardship lecture – telling the remarkable story of how he and his wife Karen transformed Hill Holt Wood in Lincolnshire into a thriving woodland and one of Britain's most successful social enterprises.



In recent years, the term social enterprise has sailed into the public realm. Lauded by David Cameron, New Labour and community activists, the potential of combining entrepreneurial dynamism with social and public benefit is irresistible for those at all points on the political spectrum.

Over the last fifteen years, Nigel and Karen Lowthrop have transformed 32 acres of run-down woodland that had been closed to the public and plundered by a timber company into a cherished and much visited public amenity. In doing so, they have helped bond the local community, provided work and training for excluded youngsters and created a shining example of living with nature. Alongside this, Nigel and his family have revived an ancient woodland and achieved a personal dream of living exemplary green lives by being completely off-grid for power, water and drainage in an age when cutting carbon footprints is a major battle cry of governments.

So whether you are interested in the historic environment, developing a more sustainable world or the power of good business, this lecture promises to inspire - as well as show us how it is possible and exciting to meet the triple-bottom line of commercial, social and environmental sustainability.

BEEF is from Simmental cross heifers fattened on grass and barley by us. The Simmental is a hardy continental breed that seems to grow well here at Falkland. These particular animals were born and spend the first years of their lives near Selkirk. They have been nurtured on Falkland Estate for another 16 months.
